The card/ pamphlet (A5 size) carries a biking safety checklist and safety message headings: 'He pahikara tou? Kia koi, kia haumarū, kia kitea! ['Got a bike? Be smart, be safe, be seen!']. It features photos of children demonstrating best practice (correctly fitted and worn helmets etc.). It also includes reflective stickers which may be applied to helmets, wheels or bikes to increase visibility. The stickers also have the safety message printed on them.

There is a preponderance of young Pacific men drowning while fishing, net-fishing etc and this new DVD especially addresses this area. It features a case study of Palu Seti Siua, a Pacific husband and father of eight who drowned when he and a friend went fishing in a dinghy and drowned while coming ashore on rocks in heavy seas. There is an interview with an affected family member about the impact of the drowning on them. There is also an interview with Ikilifi Pope, a minister of the Tongan Methodist Church, Papatoetoe, in Tongan. There are also video segments on: then correct use of flotation devices/ life jackets, putting cellphones into sealable plastic bags to use for emergency communication and the value of learning to swim.

Safe Kids Germany has recently launched its exhibition, "Children in the House!?" in conjunction with sponsor, PSD Banking Group. "Children in the House!?" features an oversized interior of a room in a mobile house modelled after an earlier "Oversized Kitchen" exhibition. Items that are double the usual proportions are used to familiarize adults with a child's perspective of the home. "Children in the House!?" strives to showcase typical hazards affecting young children at home, such as hot stoves, open windows and balconies, shelves, hazardous electric devices, and falling furniture. The exhibition will visit 18 locations in Germany, including fairs, special health promotion days, and bank events through 2009. This video item from the TV3 'Target' consumer programme advises on features to look out for

when buying secondhand prams. Sue Campbell, Child Safety Advisor of Plunket, is interviewed and she talks about the fact that there is no mandatory standard but that many are made to the Australian standard so look for that. Check that the straps are secure and that the harness works, that there are two sets of brakes and two locking mechanisms to keep the stroller upright and that all rivets and nuts and bolts are in place. Don't put 0-6 month olds in strollers. Includes a 'Stroller check list' and price advice.

This video item from the TV3 'Target' consumer programme advises on features to look out for when buying secondhand child restraints. Sue Campbell, Child Safety Advisor of Plunket, is interviewed and she talks about the age of the restraint being important (the expiry date is stamped into the plastic of the restraint). Restraints are covered by specific standards and if the standards sticker has fallen off, research the brand on the internet. Also use the internet to get the relevant use instructions to check that all parts (e.g. of harnesses) are there and check that they are working correctly.

Don't buy sight unseen as you also need to check that the restraint/ capsule fits in your vehicle and is compatible with existing seat belts and anchor tether points. Has concluding section of 'Car seat tips' about which sort of restraint is intended for which age/ size of child and suggestions about hiring restraints from Plunket or elsewhere if necessary.

This child passenger safety growth chart from the United States National Highway Traffic Safety Authority (NHTSA) includes information on several child road safety related issues. The tall and thin main image is 162 cm (5 feet) by 32 cm (but the white borders are wider). It features brightly coloured cartoon-style images of babies and children on a growth chart and shows their height in feet. The chart includes text of advice about when babies and children need to make the transitions from one style of child restraint to the next and also includes advice on: when to start teaching safe street crossing techniques and when it is safe for children to do this alone (10 years old), using helmets when biking and safe behaviour around school bus use.

This is the first time specific targets have been set for the whole sector and they are detailed in two key documents: the New Zealand Transport Strategy 2008 (NZTS) and the first Government Policy Statement on land transport funding (GPS). These are part of a raft of changes to the transport sector signalled in the recently commenced Land Transport Management Amendment Act 2008 and will be the driving force to achieving an affordable, integrated, safe, responsive and sustainable transport system."

There is a push for increased sustainability and promotion of more 'active modes of transport' (such as walking and cycling) but Safekids has concerns about increased injury risks associated with these modes unless appropriate infrastructure, education and other interventions are provided.
